

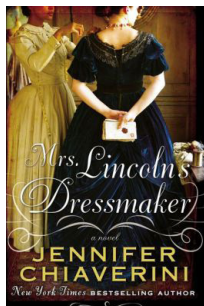

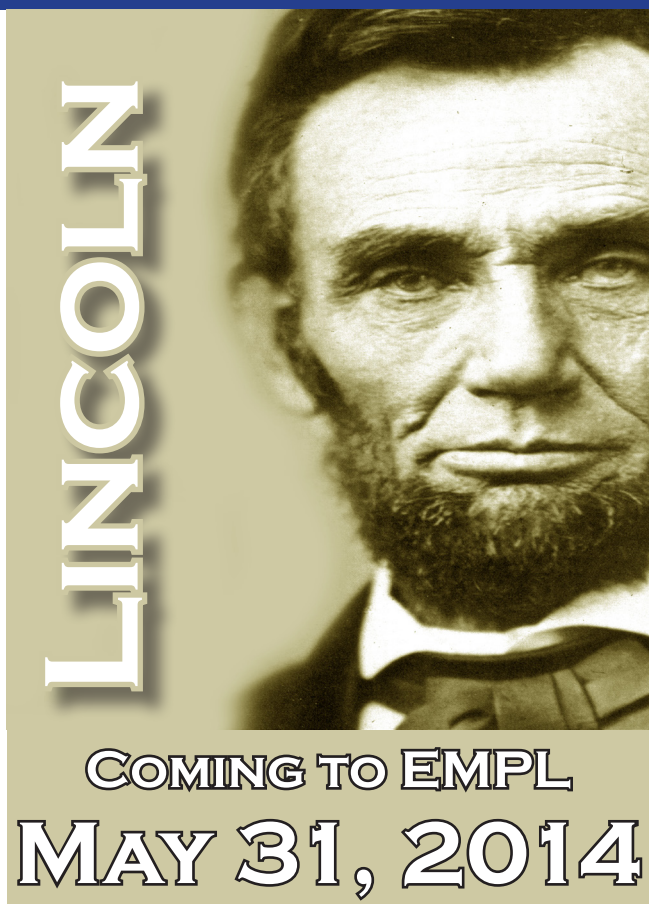
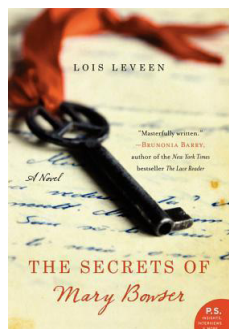


Mrs. Lincoln's Dressmaker by Jennifer Chiaverini

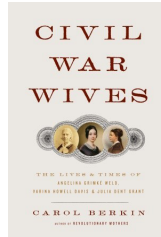

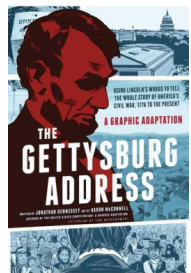
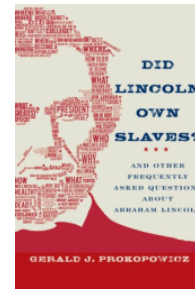
Civil War Wives: The Lives and Times of Angelina Grimke Weld, Varina Howell Davis and Julia Dent Grant by Carol Berkin

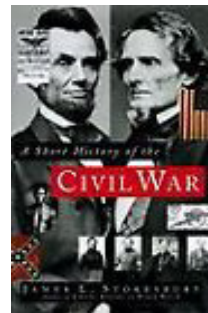
Did Lincoln Own Slaves? and Other Frequently Asked Questions About Abraham Lincoln by Gerald Prokopowicz

The Gettysburg Address: A Graphic Adaptation by Jonathan Hennessey

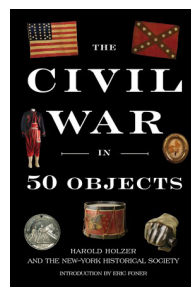
Illustrated in full color, the book interweaves American history with the words of Abraham Lincoln's address to tell the background and story of the Civil War, 1776 to the present.

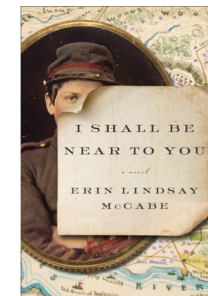
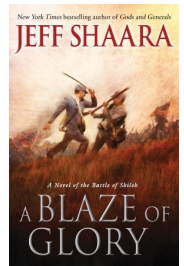
The Civil War in 50 Objects by Harold Holzer
